

Why you should enter your car in Concours By Dennis Cook

The Club's annual Concours will be held in Table View on Saturday 29 October. Typically we have the same few members bringing their cars to be judged each year, but I would like to encourage more of you to enter your cars. Concours d' Elegance is said to have begun in the late 1800's as an event for the social elite,



showing off their motoring pride and joy and dressing to suit. Today most motor clubs hold annual shows with cars being judged on condition and cleanliness. Some, such as the famous Pebble Beach Concours in California, are contested internationally with cars reflecting the best in the world. Many people may look at those who participate in Concours d'Elegance events as being "fanatical, perfectionistic, cleaning nuts.", probably thinking "he really ought to get a life!", or, "No, it really can't be that he is scrubbing inside of the engine compartment with a toothbrush?" For those who have never entered Concours because their car is not "perfect" enough, or can't compete against the recently rebuilt cars, I encourage you to take part this year. Here are some good reasons to do so:

Firstly, the cars of those who enter Concours are given a complete and thorough clean and spruce up once a year. In the process entrants will identify parts that may be rusting or deteriorating and bring them up to standard. You will be maintaining and enhancing the value of your Triumph by taking care of it. While cleaning every aspect of your car you will find things that need maintenance or repair and take care of them before they become a serious problem, possibly obviating a breakdown at some stage. A thorough wax of the bodywork will reveal blemishes and blobs that can be restored instead of being glossed over with a wash and wax. This is why I always wash my own Triumphs, even if I allow my helper to wash my daily transport. Cleaning under your car will eliminate the accumulation of grease, oil or grime that will, in time, become a rust trap.

During Concours d'Elegance the judges will check the mechanical and electrical operation of your car. Everything must work properly in order to get a top score. By preparing for Concours you will be giving your car a mini roadworthy test as you ensure that indicators, light, brake lights, hooters, steering etc. are all functioning properly. As an entrant in Concours you will be ensuring at least once a year that all parts of your car are functioning correctly and safely and that has to be good for these cars, the newest of which is more than 30 years old.

Competing in Concours gives you the opportunity to examine at close hand the cars of other Club members giving you the opportunity, not just to compare, but to learn from others who may have more experience and improve your car. Judges may help you by pointing out problems that are about to arise. You will find yourself liking your car even more as you discuss the merits of each model with others in the Club.



It is a great feeling to finish preparation for show of your car and then stand back and admire the sheer beauty of your Triumph that is why you are a collector, is it not? The pleasure of driving one of these collectible beauties is so much greater when it is sparkling clean inside and out- and think of those admiring hoots from other motorists who envy you.

We are aiming this year to have more than 1 trophy for those who enter their car for the


first time or don't usually meet the Concours Medal standard, to make it easier to win against those who usually top the lists, so get the bucket and sponge (even the toothbrush) out.

One Way to Set you timing correctly.

I have heard a lot of discussion about how to get the timing set correctly, particularly on a Healey because they only have one mark on the crankshaft pulley. You could take the crank pulley off and mark it in degrees if necessary, but this info. could apply to any make.

The photos below show a timing light sold by Sears that can make the job easy and fast. I am sure there are other brands that have the dial on the light to assure correct advance in degrees.



To use the light I have, you simply hook up the power lead clamps and clip the pick up over your number one spark plug wire. If you want 15 degrees BTDC just turn the knob on the rear of the light to 15 and adjust the distributor to make the mark on the crank pulley and the indicator finger on the engine line up. Snug the clamp bolt (do not crush or tighten to much) on the distributor



and you have your timing set. If you want to check the maximum advance as per specs. in manual, just set the dial on maximum advance for your car and rev engine to see if the crank mark and finger line up.

Note: When you are setting your timing and you see the mark on the pulley jump around, chances are you have a worn distributor shaft or the plate is not running true. This must be corrected to maintain proper timing.

The Triumph parking is on the right, just before the new pit complex. Cars are to be parked by 9h00 and may not leave before 16h00.


