There seemed to be a fair turnout of most of the popular marques, but the field was by no means full. A parade of the classic cars through the town was due for 10 am, with the aim of drumming up support by the public to pay to see the cars on show. Either the organisers were not persuasive enough, or those who came from afar were more intent on getting breakfast, but it was a rather sad and depleted parade, with only 3 Triumphs fielded and most cars remaining on the sports field. The aim of the Whales and Wheels show is to raise money for the school and it is to be regretted that there seemed to be so little enthusiasm to support this aim from the classic car clubs.



The organisers had aimed to surpass last year's show that "was acclaimed by many visitors as one of the best country shows they have attended". I don't know what the gate takings were, but it was a lacklustre event and all but over by lunchtime. The usual model car display and sale did not materialise because (apparently) the show was not seen as worthwhile to travel all that way by the exhibitors to display their wares. There was not much more than the odd pancake and hamburger to be had to eat and few unusual cars on display. Even the promised beer tent that would showcase local breweries products did not materialise and one had to pay

an entrance fee to a hospitality tent with the usual SAB products and ear splitting music in order to get a thirst quencher.

This has always been a much anticipated event in the classic car calendar, but I wonder if those who came from Cape Town and afar will be keen to drive all that way next year for so little return? The organisers might want to think of ways to make the show more attractive to both the public and participants, but next year at this time, I shall have my bacon and eggs locally.

Rebuilder's diaries


Barry Downs' TR5

Initially there was no fuel at all at the injectors but after sorting out the fuel pump and getting the correct delivery pressure, the fuel sprays out continually from the injector indicating that it is by passing the shuttle in the metering unit. Barrie then ordered new seals for the metering unit but as at the time of writing the problem is still persisting so there is much head scratching in the Downes' garage at present.

Being the perfectionist that he is I am sure there will be a solution before too long, in the meantime the brakes have been sorted out and a curious electrical gremlin is present, the left hand indicators work but not the right. Put it down to the Prince of Darkness, Mr Lucas!
