<u>SU Carburetors: A cautionary tale.</u>

I am hopefully nearing the end of a Spitfire renovation -a task that that I undertook rather reluctantly and only after much persuasion--how that came to be is a story for another day. The car had been standing immobile for the last 20 years and was quite badly neglected. However, it was complete, there was very little rust to speak of and all the body panels were nice and straight.

Amongst many other things the carbs were badly worn and with Jack Cramp no longer being with us it was decided to entrust the rebuilding of the carbs to an SU "expert" operating out of Parden Eiland. **Mistake #1**

After more than 3 months of having my chain jerked by the same old "waiting for spares—it's on back order" excuse, the day eventually arrived when enough was enough and I went and claimed the carbs back.

A strip down revealed that the spindles—as was to be expected—were well worn, the plastic pipes which are part and parcel of the main jet and which connect the main jet to the fuel bowl had become brittle after 20 years of disuse and had cracked, one butterfly was badly burred and one of the needles was actually bent!!

Part numbers were sourced via a Rimmers catalogue, an order was placed with Peter Flowers of Classically British fame and in less than 10 days all parts arrived at my doorstep—so much for the 3 month "back order" delay on SU spares.

Re-building the carbs was pretty straightforward although at the end I had to rely on Ashley Ellis for some assistance in centering the jets and correctly fitting one of the new butterflies. I then rather stupidly thought that the engine bay could do with a bit of bling and so decided to have the dashpots chromed.

The work was entrusted to a leading plating business—one which the TSCC has visited on a few occasions-- and who, up to this point, had already done a pretty nifty job on re-chroming bumpers, hinges etc on this Spitfire.

The dashpots were collected when ready and looked great. And then the drama started—during the chroming process it seems clear to me that residual deposits (pretty much like overspray when spraying a car) had found their way into the inside of the dashpots which then rendered them useless as the piston could no longer fit inside the dashpot-- never mind slide freely once in!! **Mistake #3**



Fortunately for me (and the owner of the car) I have a small collection of stripped SU's and so was able to find a matching pair of dashpots and pistons to replace the originals. Somebody else suffering the same fate might not be so fortunate.

So be warned—even the so called experts get it wrong, best to think twice


before entrusting your work to anyone, and when you do be very specific about your wants and needs.



<u>Registration of Vehicles with no papers.</u>

Hazel send this warning to those restoring cars: To date I have successfully assisted approximately 40-50 vintage & classic vehicles with zero paperwork and not on the eNatis system, to become legal on our roads.

BUT one of the issues that is surfacing is that not all owners who are restoring or creating built ups are aware that it is totally ILLEGAL to remove (& then replace) the metal plate with the VIN & Engine numbers under any circumstance. Not even when there is a colour change and the owner wishes to paint behind the plate to match the new colour.

The ONLY acceptable time is when the body behind the plate is so rusted that major repairs need to be undertaken. But PHOTOS OF THE PLATE IN SITU is then vital BEFORE the plate is removed. Photos will then also be required of the build up/restoration process as well as receipts for the parts bought for the vehicle. An affidavit stating all the reasons for the removal will also be required.

Without following the proper procedures the vehicle can legally be confiscated and scheduled to be crushed!!!

I have successfully assisted with a number of these minefield vehicles but it is far preferable for owners to be aware of this from the get go. A lot less stressful for them after spending a mini fortune on their vehicles and a lot less time consuming for both them and myself. Anyone who wishes any further info please don't hesitate in contacting me.

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
