RUN TO WELLINGTON 10TH NOVEMBER

At shortly before 10:00 on Sunday morning 10 November, members of the TSCC started arriving at Pot Belly Restaurant, our frequent starting point. Gerhard Vorster and Peter Lloyd were the first (and nearest) to arrive, shortly thereafter joined by Danie and Lynn and Eddie - four Triumphs - a TR3, a TR3A, a TR7 and a Spitfire, joined shortly thereafter by Alan Harris, wife and daughter.

At about 10:50 we eventually managed to get off to our meeting with our historic guide (!), or should I say our guide for the historic tour of Wellington, Ronald Lloyd Ronald, however, did have a 1957 TR3, which he sold in 1966, due to the imminent arrival of his eldest son, to a friend of Alan's (Harris), namely one Clive Tamlin. To this day the Lloyd family still have a signed letter by Clive acknowledging any responsibility for any damages prior to the car being registered in his name!



On meeting Ronald (and wife Cynthia) we were given a relatively brief introductory talk on the history of Wellington, and then proceeded on to various buildings associated with the remarkable Andrew Murray who did so much for tertiary education, and especially the upliftment of women in the 1800s, in yet another period



of South Africa's patriarchal history. Murray, and another Scot, Andrew Geddes Bain, who were contemporaries, more than any other persons of their time, irrevocably re-directed the course of events that were to determine the future of the town we now know as Wellington and indeed SA. The educational, social (involving The Great Trek), linguistic, and agricultural influence that the town had on South Africa's future was immense, and unlike many Boland towns is reflected by the great many architectural styles in the village, in contrast with those elsewhere in the Boland.

After an inadvertent double trip around Wellington's "Horseshoe", of especial agricultural historic interest, we visited the local tourism office, adjacent to the historic Wellington NG church, where Murray's grave and those of many of his fellow educators from overseas (and many of his family members) now rest in peace.

We then proceeded to Eddie's favourite eating-house in Wellington- namely the Gecko Lounge. I don't think any member who attended was disappointed (a) by the quality, or (b) by the quantity, as is the norm. Once again, thank you to Ronald, to Eddie for his suggestion, to Brandon (Gecko Lounge) for the lovely food, and to all those who attended.

This was a talk by Jamie Hart on the restoration of his TR4 from scrap condition. The main emphasis of the talk was the philosophy behind the rebuild and the reasons for going certain routes rather than others. He highlighted the vast differences between England of the 1960's and South Africa of the 2010's which meant that whilst the car



is essentially what it would have looked like when built in 1964, underneath the bonnet it has been suitably modified to suit local conditions. He also paid emphasis on the importance of being in a club so that information and technical assistance



could be shared.

This was the first Wednesday evening meeting for some time and it was great to welcome some members that we do not normally see too often. To celebrate we had wine and snacks after the talk which went down well and there was much fellowship after the meeting.

THE ORIGIN OF THE "SURREY TOP" BY MIKE NAPOLI

At a recent noggin Jamie was presenting a slideshow on the rebuild of his TR4 with its "surrey top"

As Jamie correctly pointed out during his presentation the term surrey top only refers to the removable/folding vinyl centre piece connecting the front windscreen to the backlight (rear windscreen surround).

This in turn prompted the question "why is it called a surrey top?" Clearly no one had a definitive answer with one wag even jokingly suggesting that they were built in Surrey.

It would now appear that this off the cuff comment was actually fairly close to the truth.

So what then is a Surrey? Wiki has this to say:

A surrey is a door less, four-wheeled carriage popular in the United States during the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Usually two-seated and holding for four passengers, surreys had a variety of **tops** that included a rigid, fringed canopy, parasol, and extension. Before the advent of automobiles, these were horse-drawn carriages.

The name is short for "Surrey cart", **named after** Surrey i**n England, where they were first made.** (My emphasis).

The surrey was initially popularised in the 1940's with the Broadway musical Oklahoma which included the popular song "Surrey with the fringe on top". When the musical was made into a blockbuster film in 1955 the song reached a much wider audience which increased its popularity.

It is my guess that in the absence of any other term the Triumph guys resurrected the surrey top moniker—bearing in mind that the car is not a convertible in the true sense of the word and that the term "Targa Top" had yet to be invented.

In closing—in 1904 did the Americans pip their English automotive counterparts by being the first to officially use the surrey term to aptly describe a motorised Surrey? I refer of course to the 1904 Knox Surrey (see attachment), let the debate begin ^(C)
