A WHALE OF A TALE PART 2 BY TIM KENT

If you have been waiting with baited breath for the second episode of this Whale of a Tale, (as many have) here it is. Those who read part one with an iota of attention will recall that the TR4A had a new engine and that I was living with my cousin in

Henley-on-Klip which is near Vereening and my place of employment was in Springs.

This meant an early morning dash across the southern Witwatersrand, a journey of about 50 miles (80kms). For the pleasure of the open road I took the route through Heidelberg, onto Nigel, Dunnottar and then Springs.

All I know is that on December 8th 1972 I set off for work, behind the wheel of a 100mph Sports car. Tuned by experts.

Oh man, life was great! "Light up a Lexington, you'll be so glad you did!" Remember that?

Ten days later I woke up in the Intensive Care Department of Johannesburg General Hospital. I had been in a coma for 10 days and physciatric evaluation declared that I was brain dead, or at least that I had suffered severe brain damage. How accurate was their diagnosis? Well, Doctors aren't often wrong, but I am here to tell the tale, so you decide. Do I hear you muttering under your breath that the Doctors were right?

I have no recollection of the accident (even to this day) because one suffers from anterior loss of memory which is the body's way of shielding one from acute trauma. The simple powers of deduction concluded that I was travelling at very high speed as I entered Heidleberg and a uniformed Policeman in his Holden entered an intersection and did not stop. He hit me on the A pillar, (or did I hit him?) I hit the steering wheel with my face (no seat belts in those days) and the TR hit first the left hand curb and then the right curb and ended up in a children's play ground, having gone through a steel palisade fence. My upper and lower jaw was broken in five places

(Yeh, that steering wheel is not cheap plastic)!

I had severe lacerations to my face and upper body. The Ambulance crew declared me dead at the scene. Was I doing 80 or 90 mph? Judging by my injuries it was probably the latter

The front and rear windscreen (surrey top) had been ripped out of their sockets, the front right wing, door and rear fender were flattened, but this was not the most serious damage. More to follow.

I was released from the Hospital on December 20th which was a mistake but all the staff wanted Christmas off, so bugger the patients, so what's new? During this hospital vacation I experienced the most excruciating pain as the breaks in my jaw began to heal but, as they healed they trapped the nerves and I was rendered inconsolable. An emergency visit to the hospital revealed that my jaw needed to broken again to relieve the trapped nerve! Hell on earth.

By about mid January I received a phone call from Cousin's lawyer which instructed me to be in the Heidleberg Magistrates Court (by 7am) for the criminal court hearing. I was there, having borrowed Cousin's friends Peugeot 403, for the whole day.

All day I sat through hearings of Pass Law infringements committed by unsuspecting Africans who were hauled up from the bowels of the building, in shackles and sentenced to lashes or incarceration. May Verwoerd twizzle in his grave. However, at about 4pm a young man came up and sat next to me. We exchanged pleasantries and I (foolishly) declared that I was lucky to be in South Africa because in England the point system on one's driving license was already in place, 12 points and you're on 'yer bike', literally. I had accumulated 9 points for various offences so another 3 and it would have been game over! "Insert another coin", except there were no more coins.

To my horror this young man was none other than the driver of the offending car, Sergeant Joubert who then, when my case was called got up to conduct his own defence and used my admissions of guilt (in England) to claim that I was driving at a reckless speed. Cousin's lawyer objected furiously and these were sustained. I was told, by the presiding Magistrate that I need not come back the next day for sentencing of the accused. Was the Magistrate his father –in-law, uncle, cousin, I will never know. But I have my suspicions.

Now, many, many, weeks later the TR was ready for release from the paneel kloppers (panel beaters) and cousin phoned to say he would collect it and drive it to the home of the Massey Ferguson director with whom we were invited for dinner. Splendid, I thought, roast beef and Yorkshire pudding and my TR. Light up a Lexington, I was so glad I did!

In the fullness of time I arrived and there to my utter jubilation was my TR, fresh out of the spray booth and resplendent in the setting sun; what joy; what ecstasy in true British Racing Green, chrome knock- ons too. I was tearful, my baby had come home.

However, all was not as it seemed. The dinner was delightful, the company got pissed and the wine was nectar, in that order. The M.F. director's wife was not so pissed (or was she?) that she tried to kiss me during "Strangers in the night". I was rudely extracted from her warm embrace and summoned to the Director's study whereupon he and Cousin advised me in parental terms to get rid of my beloved TR. It will never be the same quoth he. He, (cousin) and the M.F. director explained that the car would never ever be the same again, and he quoted chapter and verse about his experiences with the 1955 Lea Francis Le Mans experiences (when he was the chief engineer) and when a write off was the only option. Cousin was nodding in full agreement. Dam him!

What the hell does he know about anything, I asked myself. This was salt in the wound and my response was "when I want your opinion I will ask for it, until then keep your sanctimonious opinions to yourselves." I stormed out into the night, the Moon was high, the new paint glittered in the star filled sky. I got behind the wheel, gripped it and urged my beloved to prove them all wrong. We were one, whole and indivisible as I powered my way through the night at 5000 rpm through each gear, overdrive clunking in on demand I was in the seventh heaven. But all was not as it seemed, there were issues that were about to threaten my life once again.
